

1923




Cornelia Lyman Warren,
born in 1857, was a farmer and
business-woman who inherited
her family's 200-acre estate
in Waltham called Cedar Hill.
Towards the end of her life she
made plans for the property to
be donated for the public good.

Helen Osborne Storrow,

born in 1864, was a prominent American philanthropist. She was one of the first leaders of Massachusetts Girl Scouts and had the vision and resources to make a Girl Scout camp at Cedar Hill.


Girl Scout founder Juliette Gordon Low visits Camp Cedar Hill and meets with Helen Storrow in 1925.

Girl Scouts build cabins across the property (pictured circa 1928). Fourteen sites are laid out as town camps to be used for troop overnights and other recreation.

The innovative Cedar Hill Mobile Unit Caravan is launched in 1945 with funds from Helen Storrow's estate to bring girlled camping training around the state.



The Storrow House office building is built in 1956 when Massachusetts
Girl Scouts headquarters moves from Boston to Waltham.



The rolling landscape remains popular for winter recreation including skiing and sledding, demonstrated by these Girl Scouts in the 1970s.
